- ◆ National Pollution Control Day is observed annually on 2nd December.
- ◆ This day is observed to raise awareness about the importance of controlling and reducing pollution to protect the environment and human health.
- ♦ In response to the Bhopal Gas Tragedy also known as the Bhopal Disaster that occurred on 3rd December 1984, the Government of India designated 2nd December as National Pollution Control Day.
- ◆ The Bhopal Disaster is among the world's most deadly industrial disasters of all time.
- ◆ The tragedy resulted in the release of methyl isocyanate (MIC), a highly toxic gas that resulted in exposing citizens to a highly toxic and deadly gas, which led to the immediate death of many people around the neighborhood.
- This tragedy also resulted in soil and water pollution in the area thus making it unsafe to use.

National Pollution Control Day: Theme

The theme for National Pollution Control Day 2023 is "Sustainable Development for a Clean and Healthy Planet". This theme emphasizes the interrelation of environmental protection and sustainable development.
